#### **Recent Happenings at the Gardens**

Approximately twenty members of The Friends of the Royal Botanic Gardens recently paid our Gardens a visit. Tour guide extraordinaire, Shelley Wood, kept them thoroughly enthralled with her intimate knowledge of the gardens history and the 'behind the scenes' stories of the restoration of ornamental pond and Clark statue.

Helen Page of the Advisory Group reports that the Master Plan is in the hands of the Consultants. It will then be returned to HBCC before being sent to key people and published on the web site for final comments.

Head Gardener, Michael Wilkins Horticultural report notes:

- The annual pruning of the Buddleias, Plectranthus and Malvaviscus has been completed; the Canna lilies have been cut back and pruning is continuing. The path installation in Giffard and Osborne streets is receiving very positive feedback and the grass planted there is taking quite well.
- New permanent apprentice, Winter Steinhart continues to show interest in the workings of the gardens. He recently helped the Horticultural Team pruning at Rose Garden Altona adding further to his skills and getting to know other employees.
- A group of Werribee Park employees Michael recently took on a tour of the Gardens made favourable comments.
- As the Gardens requires an upgrade of the irrigation system in the forthcoming months, Michael and Shelley visited the Geelong Botanic Gardens to inspect their newly installed irrigation system. They also attended Creating Resilient Horticultural Landscapes at the combined BGANZ and Parks and Leisure seminar in July.
- General feedback from visitors to the Gardens has been positive and the Master Plan is nearing completion.

Over the past twelve months the Department of Primary Industries have placed traps around the Gardens to ensure that no 'nasties' such as exotic beetles arrive via the shipping channel.

Botanic gardens was the focus of the current edition Landscape Architecture Australia in which there is an article on Williamstown Botanic Gardens by Mark Frisby, local resident and National President of Australian Institute of Landscape Architects. Mark's concluding comments echo the feelings of many us and is worth sharing with you (with Mark's permission).

Gardens such as the Williamstown Botanic Gardens are very much part of the Australian landscape history – even if we sometimes forget the affection we have for them. More importantly, an essential part of successful public gardens is the public. A well-designed public garden provides the opportunity to bring people together in a space they cherish, which ultimately results in better, healthier communities.
